As of 17th May, gatherings of up to 30 people outdoors are permitted. • Only attend organised group litter picks if you have pre-registered with group leaders. • Continue to maintain social distancing, keeping a minimum of 2metres apart where possible from those outside your household/support bubble. • Plan your litter picking route beforehand to avoid areas of potential congregation and consider litter picking at quieter times of day. • Do not share your equipment with others. • Bring your own thick gloves to wear throughout the activity including when setting up and fastening bags. Wash them thoroughly after each litter pick. Do not share your gloves with others. • Wash hands thoroughly with hand wash or sanitiser before and after each litter pick. • Avoid touching your face. • Do not overfill bags. Once they are full please securely tie them closed. • Please double bag your Love Solihull bags, placing one Love Solihull bag inside the other. • Take additional care should you find disposable gloves and face masks. • Consider sanitising your equipment after each use or quarantine kit for 72hours. NET Risk Level	Action and Timescale
Red 9	Work should not be started or continued until the risk level has been reduced. While the control measures should be cost-effective, the legal duty to reduce the risk is mandatory. This means that if it is not possible to reduce the risk, even with unlimited resources, then the work must not be started or must remain prohibited.
Amber 7 & 8	Work should not be started until the risk has been reduced. Considerable resources may have to be allocated to reduce the risk. Where the risk involves work in progress, the problem should be remedied as quickly as possible and certainly within one month.
Amber 6	Although this risk is unlikely to happen, all reasonable efforts should be made to reduce the impact of this risk. Risk reduction measures should normally be implemented within six months, depending on the number of people exposed to the hazard.
Amber 5	Efforts should be made to reduce the risk, but the costs of prevention should be carefully considered. Risk reduction measures should normally be implemented within three months, depending on the number of people exposed to the hazard.
Green 1, 2 & 3	Whilst this level of risk is generally acceptable, consideration should be given to cost-effective solutions, or improvements that impose minimal or no additional cost burden.
Green 4	Monitoring is required to ensure that the controls are maintained.
