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Introduction

1. This Statement has been prepared to support the submission of the Solihull Local Plan, in accordance with Regulation 22 (1) (C) of the Town and Country Planning (Local Planning) (England) Regulations 2012. The statement sets out how Solihull Metropolitan Borough Council (the Council) has involved the community and stakeholders in preparing the Draft Submission Plan and how this meets the requirements set out in the Council's Statement of Community involvement (2020) and national Regulations.
2. The Statement is a statutory requirement for a Local Planning Authority in the process of submitting a Local Plan to the Secretary of State. It outlines how the Council has complied with government requirements, in line with Regulations 18 and 19.
3. The report provides information on the following:
 - An overview of the Council's engagement activities, across all individuals, groups and stakeholders during each stage of the Local Plan making process, including which bodies and persons were invited to make representations under regulation 18 and 19.
 - Which engagement activities where used during each stage of the Local Plan making process (both informal and formal).
 - How individuals, groups and stakeholders were invited to make representations to inform the Local Plan process.
 - A summary of the main issues raised by representations received through the engagement activities.
 - How those main issues have been addressed in the local plan.
4. Table 1 shows the different stages of plan preparation leading up to the publication of the Draft Submission Plan.

Consultation Methodology

5. The Council is committed to involving stakeholders and the local community in the development of Solihull's Draft Local Plan. It has adopted an approach that views consultation as an on-going activity that is integral to the plan making process. The Council has used a range of methods to engage and consult with stakeholders and the local community, in accordance with the Statement of Community Involvement 2007 and the revised version adopted in January 2020.
6. The Council has a comprehensive consultation database of consultees, and other stakeholders including residents associations, parish councils, elected representatives, community and voluntary groups, developers and businesses, infrastructure providers, government agencies and individuals.
7. Cross boundary consultation has been carried out with adjoining local authorities and parish councils.
8. Persons or organisations wishing to be included on the Council's Local Plan consultation database can sign up via the Council's website and are able update their details. Stakeholders and the local community have been informed by email or in writing of opportunities to get involved in plan making, and given a variety of options for responding, including in writing, email and on line questionnaires.
9. A range of different approaches has been undertaken, including the following methods:
 - Stakeholder meetings and briefings
 - Seminars and presentations
 - Conferences and workshops
 - Drop in sessions
 - Exhibitions at libraries
 - Questionnaires
 - Direct mailing to those on the Council's consultation database and to the occupiers of dwellings adjacent to proposed allocations.
 - Leaflets and posters
 - Site notices posted on or near allocated sites
 - Press releases, media interviews and newspaper articles
 - Email alerts using the Council's Stay Connected facility
 - Website and on-line responses
 - Webinar Q&A sessions
 - A dedicated phone line to members of the planning policy team
10. The Council has made use of links with local communities through its neighbourhood managers, and with the Solihull Partnership through meetings with working groups and partnership forums.
11. It has also utilised opportunities presented by sub-regional working to consult local authorities within the West Midlands Metropolitan area and the Coventry Solihull Warwickshire Forum.
12. The following chapters set out the consultations undertaken at each stage of plan preparation and further details on the consultation processes are set out in within the appendices of this statement.

Scope Issues and Options Consultation - November 2015

13. This initial stage of the Local Plan Review commenced in July 2015 and involved scoping of the review, consideration of key issues and development of strategic options for growth. The requirements for evidence and the need for review of policies were considered in the context of the Solihull Local Plan. Three key issues were identified; the requirements for new housing, the opportunity presented by the High Speed 2 rail link and the Interchange Station in the Borough, and the impact of growth on the Green Belt. A range of growth options was set out in the consultation.
14. Consultation on the Scope Issues and Options took place between November 2015 and January 2016. As part of the consultation, letters and emails were sent to all stakeholders on the Local Plan consultation database. Documents were made available at libraries and Council offices and exhibitions were held at various venues around the Borough. Briefings were held for Parish Councils and Residents Associations and publicity included use of Stay Connected, twitter and social media, and press releases.
15. More than 170 representations were received in response to the consultation. The main concerns were as follows:
 - Updating of evidence was essential to inform the Local Plan Review
 - The full objectively assessed housing need for the Borough was likely to be higher and should be regarded as a minimum
 - The review should make a contribution towards the wider housing market area shortfall
 - The spatial strategy based on North Solihull Regeneration was no longer appropriate given the level of growth required
 - There were mixed responses to the growth options indicating that a mix of the options was likely to be necessary.
16. In responding to the representations, the Council recognised that:
 - Significant updating of evidence would be required
 - The objectively assessed housing need should be regarded as a minimum
 - Joint working with housing market area authorities would need to continue to identify the extent and distribution of housing to meet wider needs
 - A new spatial strategy would need to be developed
 - The strategy was likely to need to draw from many if not all the growth options considered.

Draft Local Plan Consultation - December 2016

17. Following consideration of representations on the Scope Issues and Options and publication of the Summary of Representations and Council's Response in April 2016, work commenced on the Draft Local Plan. This involved commissioning of evidence, development of the Plan vision and spatial strategy and consideration of options for site allocations.
18. Consultation on the Draft Local Plan took place between December 2016 and February 2017. As part of the consultation, letters and emails were sent to all stakeholders on the Local Plan consultation database, including all those making submissions under the Call for Sites exercise and property/ landowners within or adjacent to the proposed site allocations. Documents were made available at libraries and Council offices and drop-in sessions/exhibitions were held at 8 venues around the Borough. Briefings were held for Parish Councils and Residents Associations and publicity included use of Stay Connected, twitter and social media, and press releases.
19. There were 1,750 respondents to the consultation making a total of 6,320 separate representations, with 1,150 in support and 5,165 objections, mainly on the location of new homes and infrastructure requirements. The main concerns related to the following:
 - The amount of land for new housing was either too great or insufficient
 - Concern about the impact on the Green Belt
 - Failure to utilise fully brownfield land opportunities
 - Too much reliance on large sites
 - Disproportionate impact on certain parts of the Borough
 - Poor accessibility and lack of infrastructure affecting some sites
 - Sites in Balsall Common, Dickens Heath, Knowle, Shirley and Solihull.
20. In responding to the representations, the Council recognised that:
 - Joint working with housing market area authorities would need to continue to identify the extent and distribution of housing to meet wider needs
 - Further investigation of opportunities outside the Green Belt was required, although significant Green Belt incursions were inevitable given the level of growth required
 - Further investigation of opportunities on previously developed land was needed
 - There was a need for a balanced portfolio of sites to enable delivery of a 5 year housing land supply, but that larger sites offered the greatest potential for infrastructure improvements
 - Further consideration of the geographical spread of sites was required
 - Further work on infrastructure requirements was required
 - Other opportunities for housing growth may need to be considered in certain areas.

Draft Local Plan Supplementary Consultation - January 2019

21. Following consideration of representations on the Draft Local Plan and publication of the Summary of Representations in July 2017, work continued on the Draft Local Plan, involving further consideration of housing numbers and the proposed site allocations. This included joint working with housing market area authorities on quantifying and addressing the anticipated shortfall in land for new housing, and the publication of the Strategic Growth Study in February 2018.
22. Work also commenced on concept master planning for the proposed site allocations to address concerns about infrastructure. A number of the proposed site allocations in the Draft Local Plan were no longer pursued, including Site 13 South of Shirley, and additional Sites were proposed in Balsall Common, Catherine de Barnes, Hockley Heath and Shirley, many of which utilise previously developed land.
23. The Draft Local Plan Supplementary Consultation took place between January and March 2019. The consultation included emerging work on draft concept master plans and a number of 'amber' sites not considered to be appropriate for allocation, but which performed better in the site assessments than others.
24. As part of the consultation, letters and emails were sent to all stakeholders on the Local Plan consultation database, including all those making submissions under the Call for Sites exercise and property/ landowners within or adjacent to the proposed site allocations. Documents were made available at libraries and Council offices and drop-in sessions/exhibitions were held at 6 venues around the Borough. Briefings were held for Parish Councils and Residents Associations and publicity included use of Stay Connected, twitter and social media, and press releases.
25. There were 1,092 respondents to the consultation making a total of 3,807 separate representations, with 415 in support and 2,233 objections, mainly on the location of new homes and infrastructure requirements. The main concerns related to the following:
 - Appropriateness of overall housing numbers proposed
 - Contribution to the housing market area shortfall in land for new housing
 - The environmental and sustainability impacts of growth
 - Appropriateness of the site selection methodology
 - Infrastructure requirements, particularly for the Balsall Common and Blythe areas
 - Site 3 (BC3) Windmill Lane, Balsall Common, Site 4 (BL1) West of Dickens Heath, Site 18 Sharman's Cross Road, Solihull and the 'amber' sites.
26. In responding to the representations, the Council recognised that:
 - Further work on the local housing need for the Borough was required
 - Further consideration of the recommendations of the Strategic Growth Study was needed
 - Review of the Sustainability Appraisal and other environmental evidence was necessary
 - The site selection methodology required review
 - Further consideration of infrastructure requirements was required
 - Some of the proposed site allocations would need to be re-assessed.

Draft Submission Plan Consultation - October 2020

27. Following consideration of representations on the Supplementary Consultation and publication of the Summary of Representations in July 2019, work continued on the Draft Submission Plan. This involved using the standard methodology to assess the local housing need for the Borough, and undertaking further work through the Sustainability Appraisal to assess the alternative levels of growth.
28. The site selection methodology was reviewed and the site assessment updated to ensure that environmental concerns were adequately referenced. A number of the proposed site allocations underwent further consideration, which resulted in changes to site boundaries, including Sites 1 and 3 (BC1 and BC3) in Balsall Common and Site 4 (BL1) West of Dickens Heath. Site 18 Sharman's Cross Road, Solihull was not taken forward as an allocation¹. The 'amber' sites were not considered to be appropriate for allocation, and were not included.
29. Consultation on the Draft Submission Local Plan took place between 30th October and 14th December 2020. Representations were invited on the legal compliance and soundness of the Draft Submission Plan. The consultation also included the draft Concept Masterplans and Proposed Policies Map.
30. The Council produced and published a standard representation form, guidance on how to make representations including the use of the online consultation system and a frequently asked questions paper.
31. As part of the consultation, letters and emails were sent to all stakeholders on the Local Plan consultation database. Letters to the occupiers of dwellings adjacent to allocated sites were also written to, and to ensure awareness in the wider area was achieved, site notices were displayed on or adjacent to allocated sites.
32. Online briefings were also held for Parish Councils. The consultation was publicised using the Council's stay connected alert service, social media and press releases.
33. The Covid pandemic restricted traditional consultation methods such as drop in events/exhibitions or making physical copies of the principal documents available for inspection in libraries. However, alternative consultation was undertaken through on-line video resources including live streaming of Q&A sessions. A dedicated phone line through the Contact Centre to members of the planning policy team was set up and a process was put in place to supply hard copies of the plan if interested parties had difficulty in accessing them on-line.
34. As of the 15th December 2020, the day after the end of the consultation period, viewing figures for the on-line video clips/Q&A webinar sessions were recorded as follows:
 - Solihull Local Plan – Draft Submission Plan – Introduction by Cllr Mackiewicz – 721 views
 - How to comment on the plan – 639 views
 - Live webinar and Q&A session no. 1 – 240 views
 - Live webinar and Q&A session no. 2 – 171 views

- Live webinar and Q&A session no. 3 – 138 views
35. This is a total of over 1,900 interactions with the on-line video resources.
36. There were 852 respondents to the consultation making a total of 2223 separate representations. Soon after the representations period closed, it was reported that there had been around 950 submissions. As work progressed on reviewing the submissions it became clearer that there had been 58 duplicates, 43 providing additional information, 13 incomplete and 11 late submissions. This therefore impacted on the total number of respondents noted above.
37. A number 14 of representations made reference to the six week period for making representations as not being sufficient to analyse all of the published material and then make meaningful comment on the plan, especially in the context of the additional restrictions in place as a result of the Covid pandemic.
38. The six week representations period fulfilled the legal requirement and other activities around publicity for the plan were in accordance with the Council's Statement of Community Involvement, with the exception of those prevented by Covid restrictions. The Draft Submission Plan Consultation has also followed on from previous consultations on the plan; that the draft version of the plan itself was in public domain over four weeks before being formally published; and public engagement on the plan continues as interested parties are able to participate in the examination phase of the plan process.
39. It is worth noting that whilst much evidence was available on the Council's web site prior to the publication of the plan at the end of October, a significant number of studies, updates and/or associated documents were published alongside the plan. Over the following days it was brought to the Council's attention that a small number had broken links or were otherwise not available. These were corrected as soon as possible and the Council is not aware of any specific difficulties (concerning these individual documents) that this presented to those wishing to make representations.
40. Whilst these documents may not have been available for the full 6 weeks it is not considered that this will result in any injustice as (a) there remains the opportunity for these documents to be referred to and used in examination submissions and (b) if the Inspector were to believe there has not been an adequate opportunity to review the material, provision could be made during any advertising of main modifications and/or other evidence base updates that may be necessary during the examination.
41. Appendix C to this statement (provided in a separate volume) provides a comprehensive summary of the main issues raised in the representations submitted in respect of the Regulation 19 version of the plan.

Conclusion

42. The Council has been committed to involving stakeholders and the local community in the development of the draft local plan. This is clearly demonstrated by the range and breadth of consultation and involvement since work commenced in 2015. From early meetings and workshops to draw out issues affecting the Borough and options for growth, through formal consultation on the Draft Local Plan, the Supplementary Consultation on the Draft Local Plan and the Draft Submission Plan, to stakeholder meetings and discussions to identify needs and opportunities, stakeholders and local communities have had the chance to influence the development of the Draft Submission Local Plan.
43. The Council is satisfied that it has complied with the requirements of Regulation 22(1)(c) of the Town and Country Planning (Local Development) (England) Regulations 2012 (as amended). It is also satisfied that it can demonstrate that consultation and involvement has been undertaken in accordance with the Council's Statement of Community Involvement first adopted in February 2007.
44. The Council has used a comprehensive range of consultation techniques to keep stakeholders and the local community informed and involved. These have taken advantage of the opportunities presented by web based consultation and questionnaires in particular during the Covid pandemic, as well as using traditional methods such as direct mailing, press releases and articles, exhibitions and drop in sessions, meetings and briefings.

Solihull Local Plan – Draft Submission Plan

I am writing to inform you that Solihull Council has published the Draft Submission Plan as part of its Local Plan Review.

This is a statutory consultation (Regulation 19) that is being undertaken, in order for representations to be made on the Plan before it is submitted for examination by a Planning Inspector.

As the plan-making process continues, the number of policy options are refined and become more focussed. This reflects the purpose of the Regulation 19 plan as a planning document with specific policy recommendations for an area, resulting in more formal and technical questions in the consultation process. These questions relate to the four Tests of Soundness and whether the draft Local Plan is compliant with relevant legislation.

Test of Soundness:

- **Positively prepared** – providing a strategy which, as a minimum seeks to meet the area's objectively assessed needs, and is informed by agreements with other authorities, so that unmet need from neighbouring authorities is accommodated where it is practical to do so and is consistent with achieving sustainable development;
- **Justified** – an appropriate strategy, taking into account the reasonable alternatives, and based on proportionate evidence;
- **Effective** - deliverable over the plan period and based on effective joint working on cross-boundary strategic matters that have been dealt with rather than deferred, as evidenced by the statement of common ground; and
- **Consistent with national policy** – enabling the delivery of sustainable development in accordance with the policies in the National Planning Policy Framework.

Legal Compliance:

- The plan should be included in the Local Planning Authority (LPA) current Local Development Scheme [LDS] and the key stages set out in the LDS should have been followed.
- The process of community involvement for the plan in question should be in general accordance with the LPA's Statement of Community Involvement [SCI] (where one exists).
- The LPA is required to provide a Sustainability Appraisal [SA] report when it publishes a plan. This should identify the process by which SA has been carried out, and the baseline information used to inform the process and the outcomes of that process.
- The plan should comply with all other relevant requirements of the Planning and Compulsory Purchase Act 2004 and the Town and Country Planning (Local Planning) (England) Regulations 2012, as amended

- LPA should engage constructively, actively and on an ongoing basis with neighbouring authorities and certain other bodies over strategic matters during the preparation of the plan. The LPA will be expected to provide evidence of how they have complied with the duty.

The consultation period runs until **Monday 14th December 2020** and I hope that you will take advantage of this opportunity to contribute and provide us with your views. Please use the online portal to submit your views via www.solihull.gov.uk/lpr.

If approved at this meeting, the Draft Submission Plan will then be published for a statutory period of six weeks. Interested parties will be invited to make representations relating to the soundness and legal compliance of the plan.

These representations will then form the focus of the 'Examination in Public' (EIP) that must take place before a plan can be adopted. The EIP will be overseen by a nominated inspector appointed on behalf of the Secretary of State.

After the examination concludes, the inspector will issue a report which will summarise the findings of their examination. If the plan is found to be sound and legally compliant, the Council will then be allowed to adopt the plan.

Councillor Andy Mackiewicz, Cabinet Member for Climate Change, Planning & Housing, said:

"Our Local Plan review is now nearing its conclusion, this final consultation that Cabinet is being asked to approve is simply to test whether people think the plan is sound and legally compliant. Those are the only grounds on which people can comment at this stage."

"Over the past years we have undertaken a number of consultations, workshops and engagement events, above and beyond what is required."

"We have thoroughly examined all the evidence, taken on board local concerns and listened to our neighbouring authorities to develop this plan. I am confident it will create a sustainable blueprint that reflects the climate change actions we must pursue for the future development of the borough."

"We know some difficult decisions are included in the plan, but we must take them to ensure we have the space for the jobs, homes and infrastructure we need over the coming decades."

"I look forward to discussing the plan at Cabinet and hope at the end of the meeting we will be in a position to get final sign off at full Council next week to begin the final consultation, so that we can move towards an EIP in 2021."

Following the full Council meeting, the formal six-week period of representations will be introduced and will be likely to start later in October.






Solihull's Local Plan will guide the development of the borough for the next decade, and beyond. It is the basis for future planning decisions as it creates a 'blueprint' for when and where major developments can take place, and where they shouldn't take place.

Interested parties should make their representations via the Local Plan Review page of the Council website (<https://www.solihull.gov.uk/lpr>). At this stage there is a formal way of sending in a representation, which is explained in a short video available on the same page, alongside guidance notes.

Once the examination concludes, the inspector will issue a report which will summarise the findings of their examination. If the Plan is found to be sound and legally compliant, the Council will then be allowed to adopt the Plan, or the Inspector may suggest that the Plan is modified.

The representation period will close on Monday 14 December.
