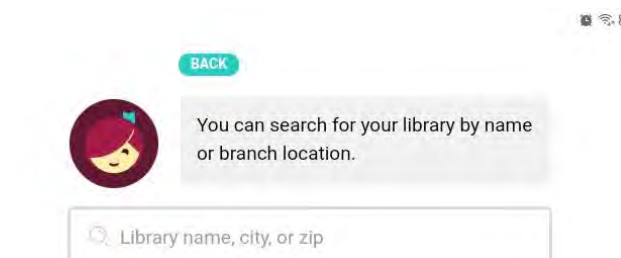
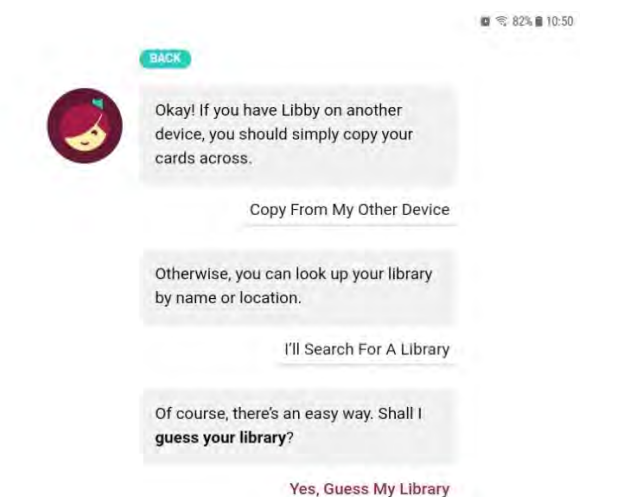
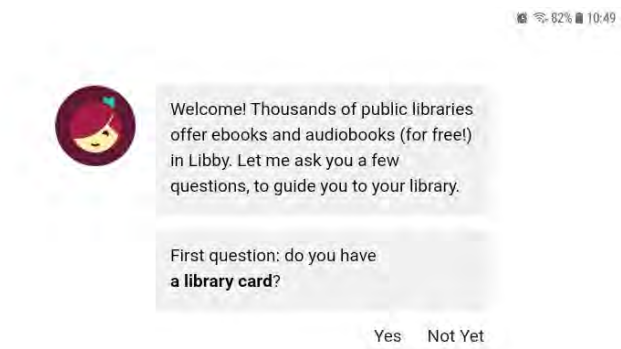


## Borrowing emagazines on the Libby app

### Logging in

Once you have downloaded the Libby app, you will need to choose your local library. You can have more than one library service on the app. You will need to download the app appropriate for your device ie from the App Store for Apple devices and the Google Play Store for Android devices.

For your library, search for Solihull or an individual branch library within Solihull, the service is the same.

Guess your Library will detect your location from the device itself, ie a GPS-type location.

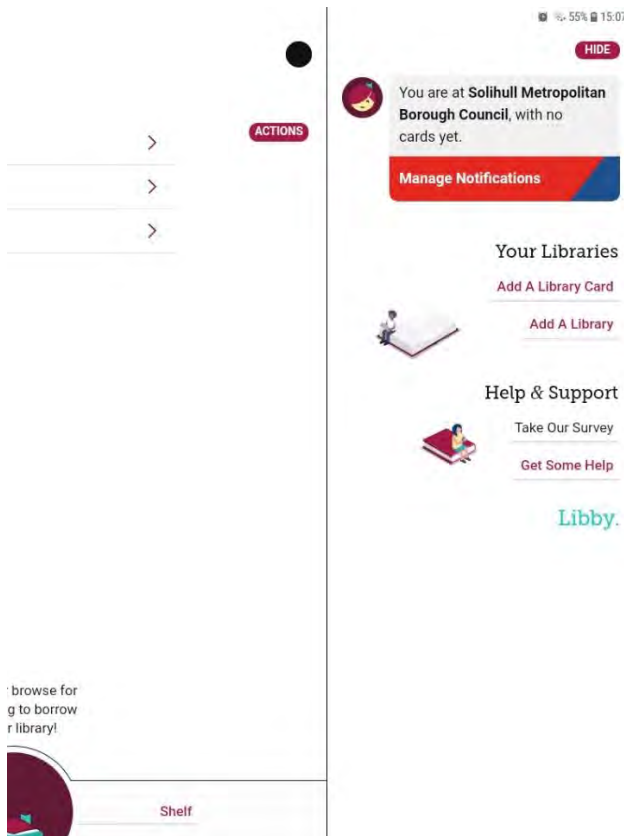

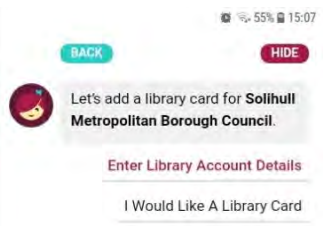
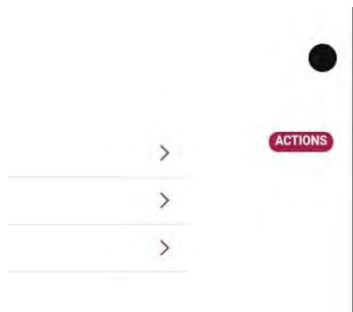
Once you have chosen Solihull, you will need to register your library card or number

Click on the symbol at the top right

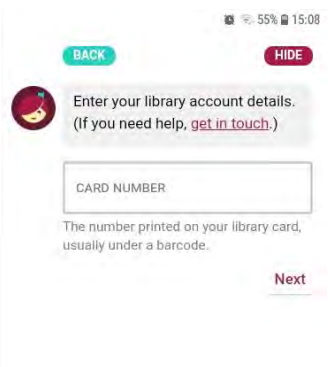
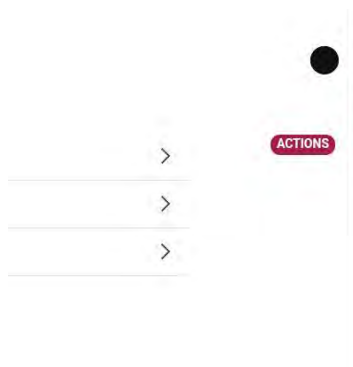


Click Add a Library Card

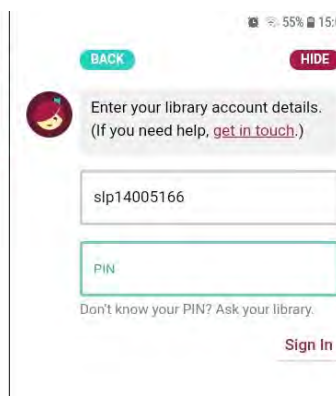
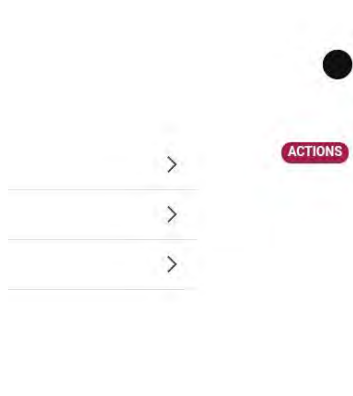
You can add more than one person's card and add cards for other libraries outside Solihull



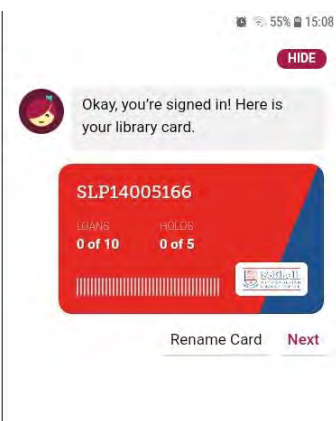
You can enter a library card number here  
Click on Enter Library Account Details



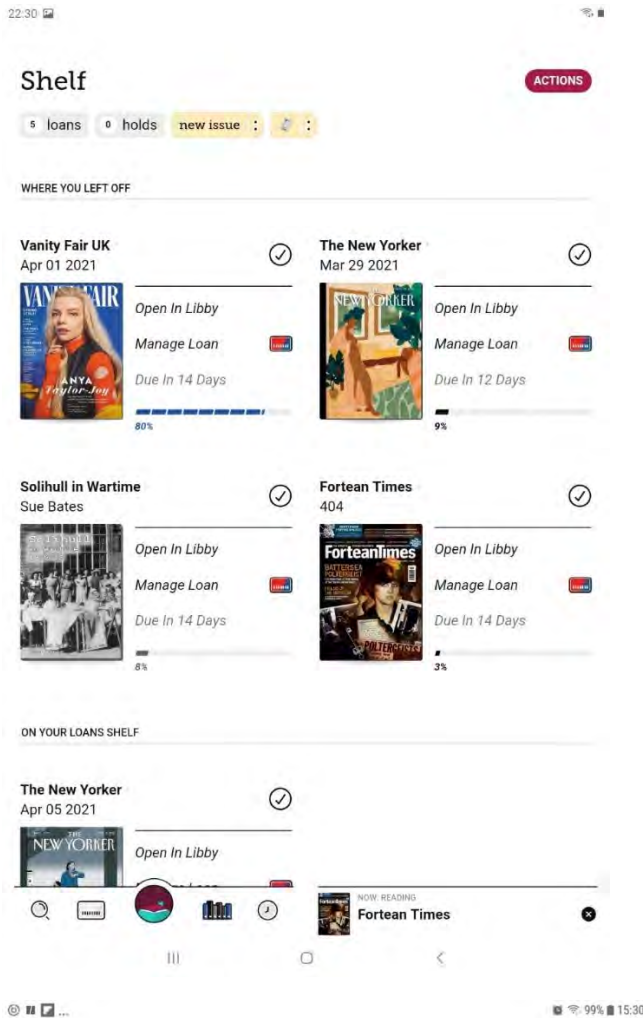
Enter a library card number with the letters included, and with no spaces eg  
SLP1234567x  
WP0000010000  
H00001234  
Letters can be upper or lower case.



Enter your PIN  
This will always be a 4 digit number.  
Then click Sign In



Once signed in, your card will display like this. You can rename the card if you want to distinguish from another family member's.



Once registered, you can start downloading and reading.

Library is where content will be available

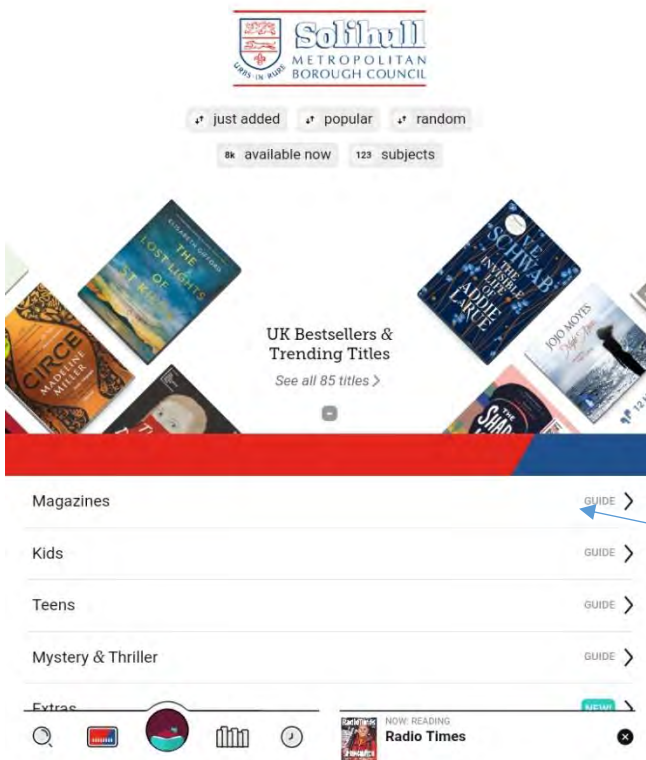
Shelf is where what you have borrowed will appear.

The Navigation bar shows from left to right:



- A search box
- A link to the Library
- The start page
- Your Shelf
- A Timeline where you can see when loans are due back

Click on the second symbol that looks like a library card to get back to the home screen

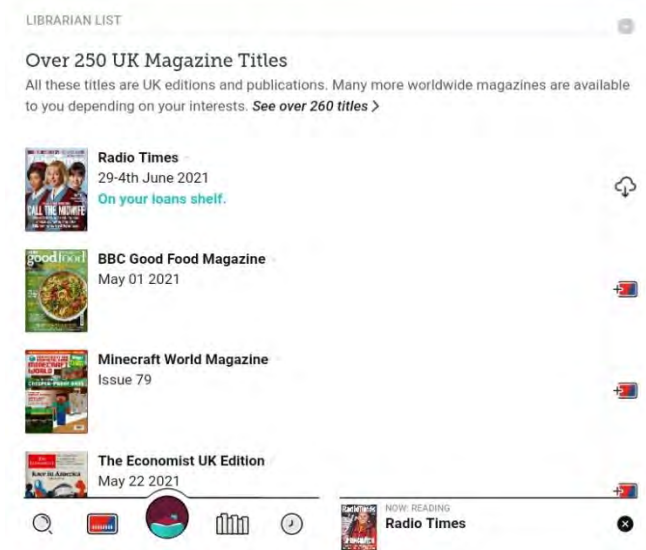


From the Home screen you can find titles to read.

The magnifying glass at bottom left lets you Search for particular titles or words

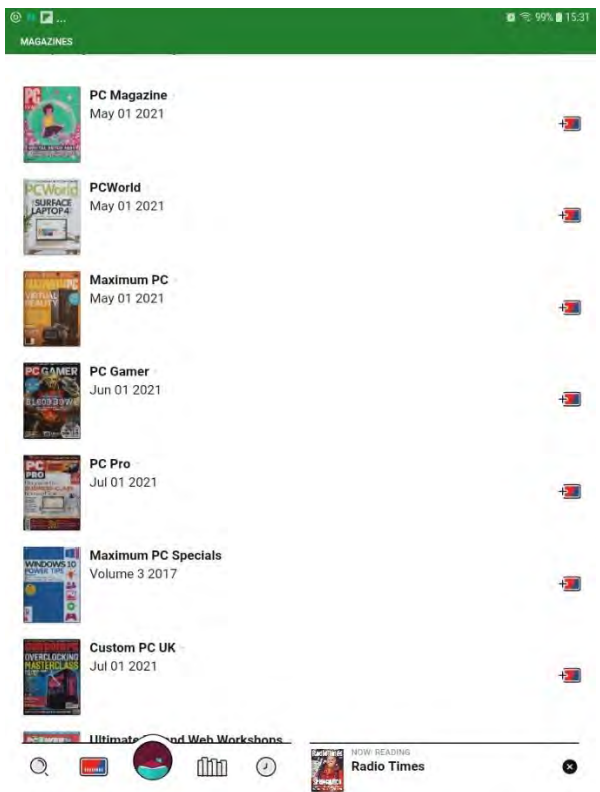
The best way of finding magazines is to click on the Magazines tab

A new upgrade of the Libby app allows you to set notifications for new issues of titles, see the instructions later on.



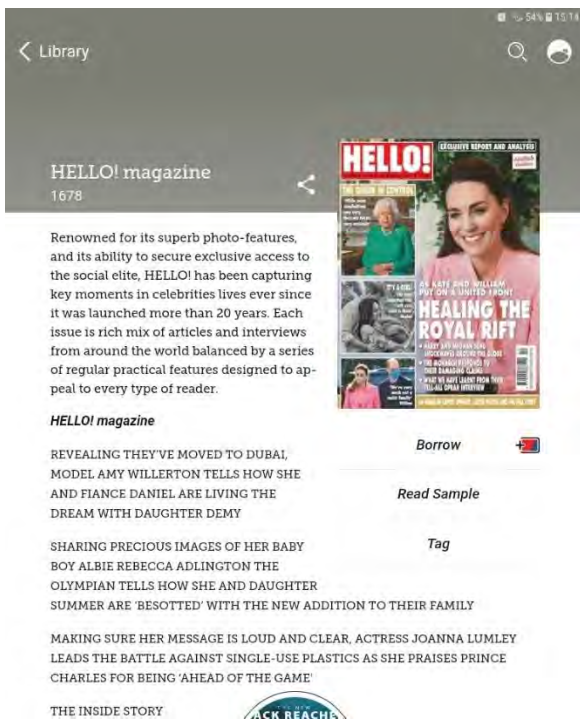
In the Magazines Page, you will have selections by subject of the more than 3000 titles available.

The first one is all the UK magazine titles, with newest issues first



Categories include Business, Celebrity and many more

We are able to create categories so please watch out for more – this one is Computing, which excludes the Gaming and other Tech magazines.

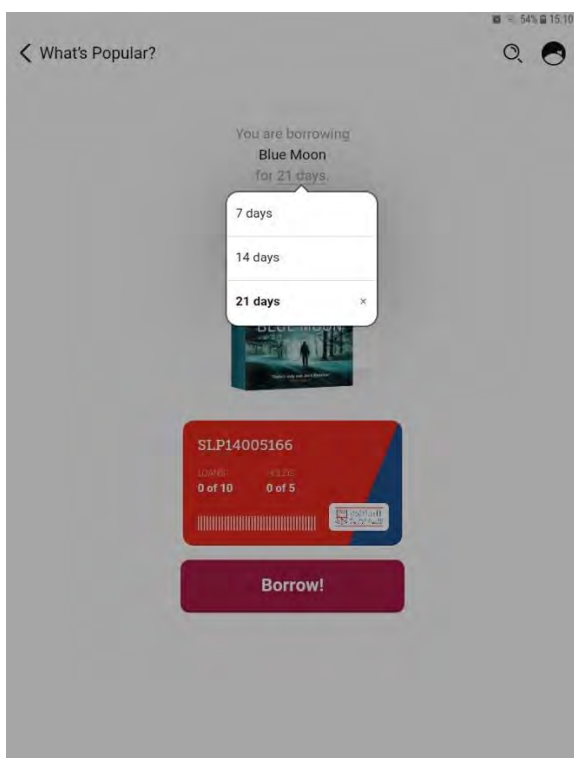


For each title and issue there is a summary page.

If you scroll further down, previous issues of the title will be shown – 3 years' worth are available.

If you want to borrow the issue, click on Borrow.

There is no limit to how many titles or issues of titles you borrow, but they are all lent for up to 3 weeks.



You can choose how long you want the loan for.

Remember you can return the loan once you have finished with it

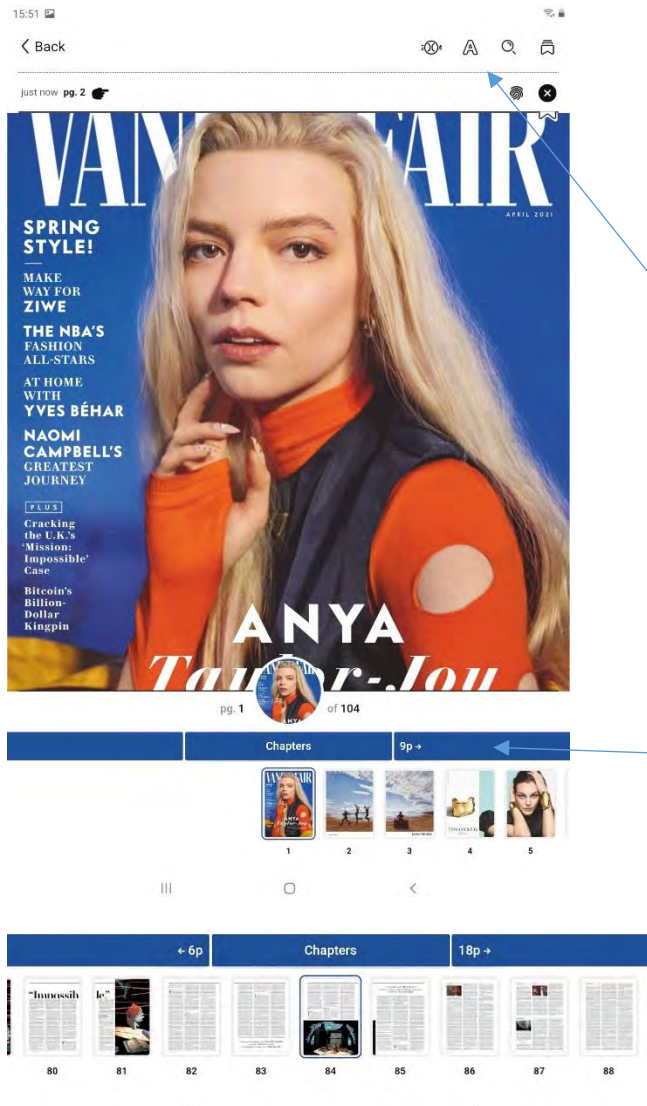
Click on the large Borrow! Button once you have chosen the length of the loan.

Once borrowed, click on Open Magazine to view it

The magazine will be in your Shelf until you return it or the loan period expires.



## Reading the emagazine



Within the emagazines there are a variety of features to help you read it more comfortably.

You can of course use your standard enlarge feature on your tablet or phone.



At the top right of the page there are symbols (in order shown) allowing you to enlarge the text, change the size and lighting, search the title or add a bookmark.

At the bottom of the page click on the image of a specific page to jump to it, or just swipe left or right to move the page back and forth.

You can also jump 6 pages ahead and backwards in the box saying 6p, either side of the Chapters heading.

If you go to the Contents page of the magazine you can jump to specific articles.

At the bottom of an article click Read the Article to view it in a larger text and laid out in a different form.

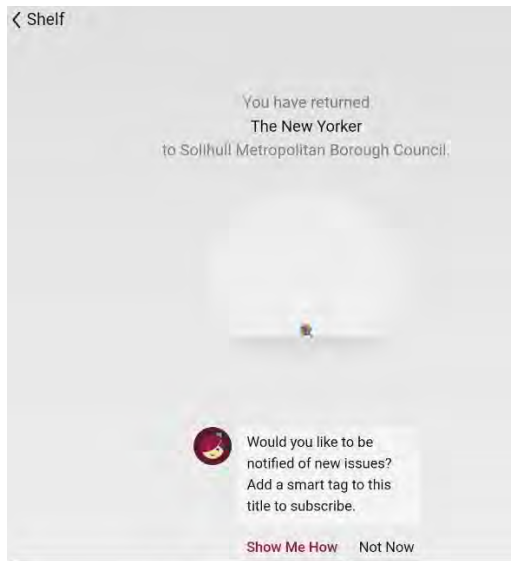

## Setting notifications for new issues of magazines



### New Tag



A Notify Me tag will let you know when one of your libraries acquires titles in a series, or by the same author.

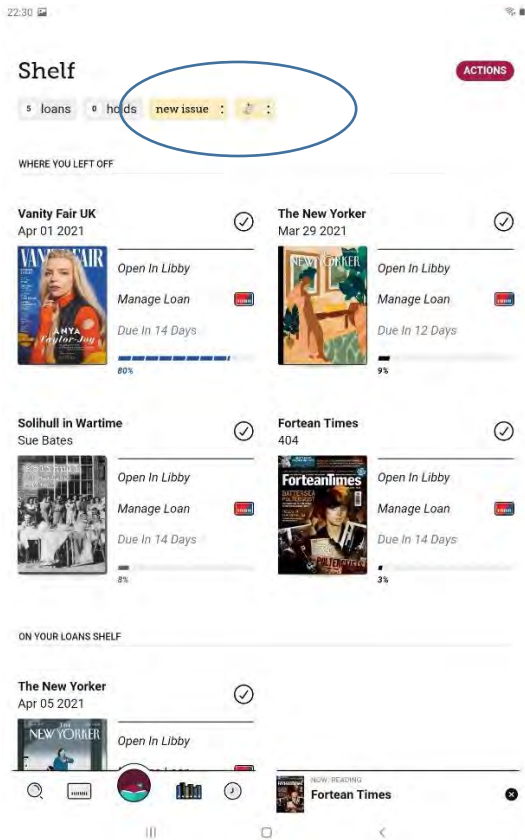
You'll receive a push notification or email when new titles are added.

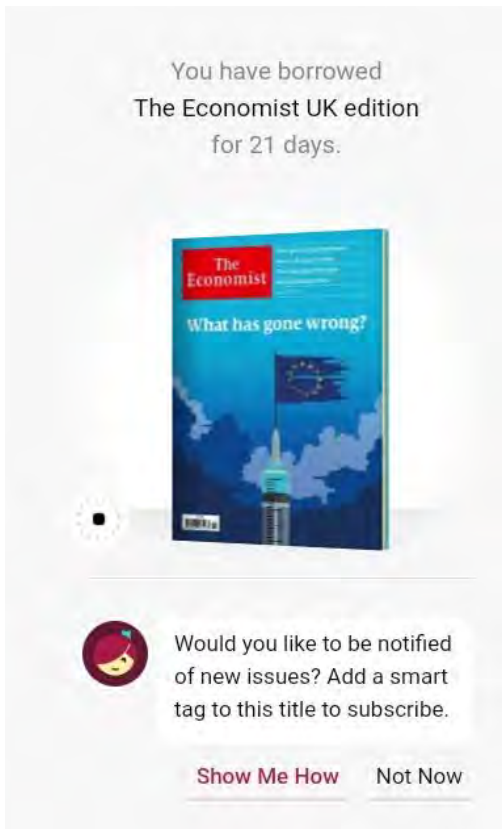
A new feature is the ability to set notifications for when new issues of emagazine titles come out.

This is called a Notify Me tag. With this you can enable your tablet to provide a notification when a new issue comes out, though you would still need to borrow it.

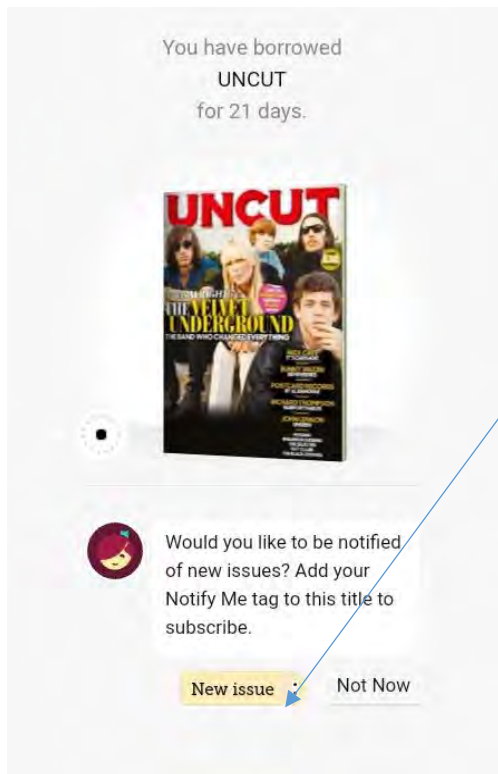




You can choose as many titles to be notified about as you want.



You will be prompted to set a notification when you borrow a title.  
If you haven't set up a named tag, you can do this here.



If you have set up a tag you can use the same one for multiple titles.

The notification appears at the top of the screen on your tablet, like notifications of news or new updates for apps.

### **Returning an emagazine**

You can return an emagazine you have finished it even if the loan period has not expired.

To do this click on Manage Loans in your Shelf

There is no limit on emagazine loans so unlike ebooks and eaudiobooks other customers can view the same magazine.
