


Kingshurst & Fordbridge Ward Profile 2024



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Technical Guide to Ward Profiles

The JSNA is how local authorities and Integrated Care Boards assess the current and future health, care and wellbeing needs of the local community. Leading to agreed commissioning priorities that will improve the health and wellbeing outcomes and reduce inequalities.



Sub-borough data is available at a variety of levels. As well as the borough's 17 electoral wards, the majority of data is based on the standard Census geographies:

- Lower Super Output Areas (LSOAs) local neighbourhoods based on a minimum population of 1,000 and an average of 1,500 (134 in Solihull);
- Middle Layer Super Output Areas (MSOAs) containing an average of 7,200 persons (29 in Solihull).

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Summary

About Solihull

Solihull lies at the heart of the West Midlands motorway network, has excellent public transport connections with the Birmingham city conurbation and is linked to many overseas destinations through Birmingham International Airport.

There are 148,000 jobs located in Solihull with strengths in business services, transport and manufacturing. The borough benefits from a range of key economic assets such as Solihull town centre, the NEC complex, Jaguar Land Rover and Birmingham Business Parks.

Solihull is a largely affluent borough, characterised by above average levels of income and limited levels of poverty and deprivation. For instance:

- 73% of Solihull households own their own home compared to 62% for England and 64% for the West Midlands.
- The median annual wage of Solihull residents in full-time employment is 11% higher than the England average and 18% higher than that for the West Midlands.
- 13% of the Solihull working age population claim Universal Credit compared to 15% for England and 17% for the West Midlands.
- 14% of Solihull children aged 0-15 years live in a low income household compared to 20% for England and 27% for the West Midlands.
- The 2019 Index of Multiple Deprivation (IMD) shows that Solihull is the least deprived local authority in the West Midlands. Just 16% of the population live in one of the most deprived 20% of neighbourhoods in England, whereas 40% of people live in the least deprived 20%.

This is not the case for all Solihull communities and below average incomes and poverty is far more common among households in the three North Solihull wards (Smith's Wood; Kingshurst and Fordbridge; Chelmsley Wood). For instance:

- Just 47% of North Solihull households own their own home while 40% are social rented.
- 31% of the North Solihull working age population claim Universal Credit.
- 29% of North Solihull children aged 0-15 years live in a low income household.
- According to the IMD 52% of people in north Solihull live in one of the most deprived 20% of neighbourhoods in England, including 11% who live in the most deprived 5%.

About Kingshurst and Fordbridge

Kingshurst and Fordbridge is one of the Borough's three densely populated northern wards and is a focus for redevelopment and neighbourhood improvement. Its socio-economic indicators reflect this status with all measures less favourable than the Solihull average. Of the nine LSOAs either wholly or partially contained within the ward, six are in the most 10% deprived of neighbourhoods in the country, although there are relatively more advantaged areas in Central Kingshurst and Babbs Mill South, where private housing predominates.


The regeneration of Kingshurst and Fordbridge seeks to bring about long-term sustainable benefits for residents through changes to the tenure mix and types of housing available to local people and through improvements to schools, community facilities, retail, leisure and employment services. At the same time key strengths will be maximised such as the Kingshurst shops on Marston Drive and the landscape features of Babb's Mill Lake, Yorks Wood and the River Cole.

Population and Households

Population Size and Growth


The 2021 Census shows that 13,324 people live in Kingshurst & Fordbridge, representing 4,763 people per $\rm km^2$ (Population density Solihull 1,213 and England 434 per $\rm km^2$). Kingshurst & Fordbridge has the $\rm 4^{th}$ largest population density of Solihull's 17 wards.

Between 2011 and 2021 the Kingshurst & Fordbridge population increased by 549 people. This equates to growth of 4.3% over this 10-year period in-line with the Solihull (4.6%) average but lower than that for England (6.6%). Population growth in Kingshurst & Fordbridge was the 8th highest out of Solihull's 17 wards.

Solihull Population Growth 2011 - 2021




Population Age Groups

24% of the Kingshurst & Fordbridge population are under 16 years of age (including 8.9% aged 5 and under), 62% are working age and 14% are aged 65 and over (including 1.9% aged 85+).

The size of the under 16 population in Kingshurst & Fordbridge (24%) is larger than Solihull (19%) or England (19%), while the number aged 65+ is proportionally smaller (14% Kingshurst & Fordbridge, 21% Solihull, 18% England).

Age Structure in Kingshurst & Fordbridge




In the 10-years 2011 to 2021 population growth in Kingshurst & Fordbridge has varied by age group with high rates among those aged 50-64 (+23%) and 25-34 years (+27%). This has been partially offset by population decline among young people aged 16-24 (-17%) and by those aged 35-49 (-11%). However the fall in population in certain age groups in Kingshurst & Fordbridge is consistent with the Solihull and England averages.

Comparing the 10-year population growth rates of Kingshurst & Fordbridge and England shows that the changes have tended to be in same direction, but at least among those under 50 years, more pronounced in Kingshurst & Fordbridge.

% Change in Population in Kingshurst & Fordbridge by Age Group 2011 - 2021




Ethnicity

87% of the Kingshurst & Fordbridge population are white and 13% from an ethnic minority background. Kingshurst & Fordbridge has a proportionally smaller ethnic minority population than either Solihull (18%) or England (19%). 44% of the ethnic minority population in Kingshurst & Fordbridge are from a mixed or multiple ethnic group representing 6% of the wards total population.

Kingshurst & Fordbridge has the 5th Smallest ethnic minority population among Solihull's 17 wards, but the largest mixed or multiple ethnic group population and the 2nd largest Black/Black British population.

Ethnic Minority Population in Solihull 2021




The ethnic minority population in Kingshurst & Fordbridge is proportionally higher among younger than older age groups. For instance, 19% of those under 25 are from an ethnic minority background compared to just 3% of those aged 65+.

The pattern in Kingshurst & Fordbridge is the same as England, with the ethnic minority population higher among younger age groups in both. A sharp reduction in the ethnic minority population from the age of 50 onwards is evident in both Kingshurst & Fordbridge and England.




In the 10-years 2011 to 2021 the proportion of Kingshurst & Fordbridge residents from an ethnic minority background increased from 9% to 13% of the population.

Although the Kingshurst & Fordbridge population increased by around 4% the number of ethnic minority residents increased by 53% (611 individuals) in the 10 years to 2021. In absolute terms the increase in the Kingshurst & Fordbridge ethnic minority population was largest among those from a mixed of multiple ethnic group (+269 individuals) followed by the Asian/Asian British population (+254).

Growth of 53% in the ethnic minority population in Kingshurst & Fordbridge in the 10 years to 2021 is higher than the England average (38%) but is smaller than that for Solihull (+72%). Growth in the ethnic minority population in Kingshurst & Fordbridge is the 3rd lowest among Solihull's 17 wards.

Religion

52% of the Kingshurst & Fordbridge population who answered the Census question on religious identification said that they had a religious faith, with 48% saying they had no religion. Kingshurst & Fordbridge has proportionally more people with no religion than Solihull (35%) or England (39%).

Like Solihull and England as a whole, Christianity is the most common religious faith in Kingshurst & Fordbridge (49%).

Origin and Language

At the time of the 2021 Census, around 94% of the Kingshurst & Fordbridge population lived at the same address that they were resident in a year before. Of the remainder, most migrants lived elsewhere in the UK (97% of Kingshurst & Fordbridge migrants, 6% of Kingshurst & Fordbridge population) with a small number coming from outside UK (3% of Kingshurst & Fordbridge migrants, 0.2% of Kingshurst & Fordbridge population).



92% of the Kingshurst & Fordbridge population were born in the UK (90% Solihull, 83% England). Just 8% of the Kingshurst & Fordbridge population were born overseas (1,030 individuals). Proportionally Kingshurst & Fordbridge has the 8th lowest overseas population in Solihull.



53% of the Kingshurst & Fordbridge population born overseas were born in Europe (545 individuals), with 23% born in the Middle East or Asia (233 individuals), 14% (144) in Africa and 9% (91) in the Americas & Caribbean.

The Census data shows that the majority of Kingshurst & Fordbridge overseas population arrived since 2001 (66%) including 27% who have arrived since 2014 (fewer than England where new arrivals represent 34% of the total). However, 21% of Kingshurst & Fordbridge migrants arrived prior to 1981, slightly fewer than across Solihull but higher than the England average (14%).

Households




Households with Dependent Children in Solihull 2021



About 69% of single parent households in Kingshurst & Fordbridge contain dependent children. The proportion of single parent households with dependent children is considerably higher than both the Solihull and England averages (15.6% of all households in Kingshurst & Fordbridge, 7.2% Solihull, 6.9% England). Kingshurst & Fordbridge has the 3rd highest number of single parent households in Solihull.


Single Parent Households with Dependent Children in Solihull 2021



Fewer households in Kingshurst & Fordbridge are occupied by older people than the benchmarks (19% of all households Kingshurst & Fordbridge, 26% Solihull, 22% England). Kingshurst & Fordbridge has a smaller proportion of both older couple households and single older people households. Kingshurst & Fordbridge has 719 single older people households and at 13% of all households in the ward is the 4th smallest proportion in Solihull.


Single Older People Households in Solihull 2021



Deprivation, Benefits and Poverty

For much of 2022 and 2023 UK households have been subject to high levels of inflation and a squeeze on living standards. This is reflected in local survey results, with 70% of respondents to the 2022 Place Survey saying that they were more worried about their finances than a year previously. This pattern was replicated across all three Solihull localities.

<u>Index of Multiple Deprivation</u>

The Index of Multiple Deprivation (IMD) is the official measure of deprivation in England produced by the Ministry of Housing Communities and Local Government (MHCLG). The IMD combines 39 economic, financial, social, environmental and housing measures into a single deprivation score for individual neighbourhoods called Super Output Areas (LSOAs) in England. There are 32,844 LSOAs in England and 134 in Solihull with an average population of 1,500.

The IMD therefore allows each LSOA neighbourhood to be ranked relative to one another according to their level of deprivation.

The 2019 IMD shows that Solihull is the least deprived upper tier Local Authority in the West Midlands and is ranked in the 2nd top quintile nationally.


Solihull is relatively polarised between large parts of the borough that rank among the least deprived areas of England and a concentration of neighbourhoods in North Solihull among the most deprived.




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Deprivation is substantially higher in the North Solihull wards of Chelmsley Wood, Kingshurst & Fordbridge and Smith's Wood than elsewhere in the borough. The deprivation evident in North Solihull is part of a wider area of disadvantage that spreads throughout east Birmingham.

2019 Index of Multiple Deprivation (IMD)


Overall Rank LSOAs in Solihull & East Birmingham in Most Deprived 10%

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Kingshurst & Fordbridge's nine LSOAs are, on average, ranked on the 14th percentile nationally, with the 17 Solihull wards ranging from the deprived Chelmsley Wood ward (9th percentile) to the advantaged St Alphege (94th percentile). On this basis Kingshurst & Fordbridge would be considered one of the 15% most deprived areas in England.

Deprivation among the nine Kingshurst & Fordbridge LSOAs ranges from the most deprived neighbourhood Bennett's Well on the 2nd percentile to the least deprived neighbourhood Central Kingshurst on the 34th percentile. Six out of the nine of Kingshurst & Fordbridge LSOAs are among the most deprived 10% of neighbourhoods in England, including two in the most deprived 5%.


Universal Credit

As of July 2023 2,358, Kingshurst & Fordbridge residents were claiming Universal Credit (UC), equating to 28.7% of the working age population. The rate in Kingshurst & Fordbridge is much higher than that for Solihull (12.7%) or England (14.7%). The UC claimant rate in Kingshurst & Fordbridge is the 3rd highest in Solihull.

37% of the UC in Kingshurst & Fordbridge are in employment and 63% not in employment, this is broadly in-line with the Solihull and England averages.


Universal Credit Claimant Rate in Solihull July 2023



Child Poverty

At the end of 2021/22 929 children aged 0-15 years in Kingshurst & Fordbridge lived in a low income household. This equates to 28% of the 0-15 population, higher than both the Solihull (15%) and England averages (20%). The rate in Kingshurst & Fordbridge is the 2nd highest among Solihull's 17 wards which range from 30% in Smith's Wood to 4% in St Alphege.

Children aged 0 - 15 years in a low-income household in Solihull 2021/22




The number of children living in a low-income household in Kingshurst & Fordbridge varies more between age groups than across England. In particular, a relatively high proportion all Kingshurst & Fordbridge children living in a low-income household are under 5 years of age (35%) and a relatively small proportion are aged 11-15 years (27%).

The number of Kingshurst & Fordbridge children living in a low-income household averaged 777 in the six years 2016/17 to 2021/22. There was a substantial rise from 702 at the end of 2018/19 to 828 at the end of 2019/20 coinciding with the onset of the outbreak of covid-19. This rise is consistent with those across Solihull and England.

On this basis Kingshurst & Fordbridge would be considered one of the 15% most income deprived areas in England for children.



Older People Poverty



Fuel Poverty

Fuel poverty is measured by the Department for Business, Energy & Industrial Strategy which determines that those households which are below the poverty line and at the same time are energy inefficient and fuel poor.

1,131 Kingshurst & Fordbridge households were classified as fuel poor in 2021. This equates to 18.5% of all Kingshurst & Fordbridge households, more than the Solihull (12.7%) and England (13.1%) averages. Among the 17 Solihull wards Kingshurst & Fordbridge has the 2nd highest fuel poverty rate.



Unemployment Rate in Solihull March 2021




Occupation of Employed People in Kingshurst & Fordbridge 2021


Employed in Manufacturing in Solihull March 2021




Claimant Count Unemployment

As at August 2023 560 people in Kingshurst & Fordbridge were in receipt of unemployment benefit. This equates to a claimant unemployment rate of 6.8%, much higher than the Solihull (3.2%) and England (3.8%) averages. Kingshurst & Fordbridge has the 2nd highest claimant unemployment rate among the 17 Solihull wards.


Resident Qualifications

Working age Kingshurst & Fordbridge residents tend to have lower levels of formal qualifications then the benchmarks. For instance, just 21% of Kingshurst & Fordbridge residents (1,704 individuals) had NVQ level 4+ qualifications in March 2021 compared to 40% of the Solihull population and 37% of people in England.

Formal Qualification Levels of Kingshurst & Fordbridge Population Aged 16 – 64 Years 2021






General Health of Population Kingshurst & Fordbridge 2021


Disability in Population Kingshurst & Fordbridge 2021


Life Limited a Lot by Long – Term Health Condition Solihull Population 2021







Female Life Expectancy in Solihull 2016 to 2020




Hospital Admissions


Emergency Hospital Admissions 2016/17 to 2020/21

Admissions for Alcohol 2016/17 to 2020/21



Incidence of Cancer 2015 to 2019



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



Standardised Mortality Ratio





Households Living in a Flat in Solihull 2021



Overcrowding


Household overcrowding is assessed by comparing the number of people in a household against the number of bedrooms that they require based on the bedroom standard which determines that adults, children over 16 and children between 10 and 15 of a different sex are entitled to their own bedroom. Overcrowding occurs when the number of bedrooms in the accommodation is less than the number required under this bedroom standard.

A small majority of households in Kingshurst & Fordbridge have at least one spare bedroom and are considered under-utilised (59%, 3,225 households), although this is less common than across Solihull and England. (Based on Number of Bedrooms)




Access to Car or Van

Households with access to a car or van in Solihull 2021



Community Satisfaction and Belonging



Satisfaction with local area as place to live






How has local area changed in last 2 years




People from a different background get on well together in local area

35% of respondents to the 2022 Solihull Place Survey say that they can influence decisions that affect their local area while 57% do not feel they can influence decisions. Fewer people in North Solihull feel they can influence decisions than elsewhere in the borough (28%).


To what extent do feel able to influence decisions that affect your local area

Despite the fact that 57% of respondents to the 2022 Solihull Place Survey say that they cannot influence local decisions only 36% say that they would definitely like more involvement with 33% saying that they definitively do not want to be involved. The results for this measure do vary across the borough and in North Solihull 49% say that they do not want more involvement far higher than in other Solihull localities.


Would like to be more involved in local decisions



On average 34% of respondents to the 2022 Solihull Place Survey say that they have taken part in formal volunteering (defined as unpaid help to any group, club or organisation such as sports coaching or supporting a faith organisation) over the last year, including 21% who volunteer at least once a month. Participation in North Solihull is low, with a participation rate of just 27%.


Have taken part in informal volunteering in last year



Community Safety

59% of Solihull respondents to the 2022 Place Survey say that they feel safe after dark whereas 27% feel unsafe. There is a significant difference between North Solihull and the rest of the borough on this measure, with just 45% of North Solihull residents feeling safe after dark compared to an average of 64% across the rest of the borough.


Feeling safe after dark in local area



Respondents to the 2022 Solihull Place Survey were asked which of 10 types of antisocial behaviour were a problem in their local area. The most commonly cited problem in North Solihull was people using or dealing drugs (52% of respondents) followed by rubbish & litter (48%), vehicle nuisance (45%) and vandalism (41%). Each type of ASB was considered a problem by more North Solihull respondents than the Solihull average.






Annual Reported Number of Crimes in Kingshurst & Fordbridge
