


St Alphege Ward Profile 2024



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Technical Guide to Ward Profiles

The JSNA is how local authorities and Integrated Care Boards assess the current and future health, care and wellbeing needs of the local community. Leading to agreed commissioning priorities that will improve the health and wellbeing outcomes and reduce inequalities.



Sub-borough data is available at a variety of levels. As well as the borough's 17 electoral wards, the majority of data is based on the standard Census geographies:

- Lower Super Output Areas (LSOAs) local neighbourhoods based on a minimum population of 1,000 and an average of 1,500 (134 in Solihull);
- Middle Layer Super Output Areas (MSOAs) containing an average of 7,200 persons (29 in Solihull).

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Summary

About Solihull

Solihull lies at the heart of the West Midlands motorway network, has excellent public transport connections with the Birmingham city conurbation and is linked to many overseas destinations through Birmingham International Airport.

There are 148,000 jobs located in Solihull with strengths in business services, transport and manufacturing. The borough benefits from a range of key economic assets such as Solihull town centre, the NEC complex, Jaguar Land Rover and Birmingham Business Parks.

Solihull is a largely affluent borough, characterised by above average levels of income and limited levels of poverty and deprivation. For instance:

- 73% of Solihull households own their own home compared to 62% for England and 64% for the West Midlands.
- The median annual wage of Solihull residents in full-time employment is 11% higher than the England average and 18% higher than that for the West Midlands.
- 13% of the Solihull working age population claim Universal Credit compared to 15% for England and 17% for the West Midlands.
- 14% of Solihull children aged 0-15 years live in a low income household compared to 20% for England and 27% for the West Midlands.
- The 2019 Index of Multiple Deprivation (IMD) shows that Solihull is the least deprived local authority in the West Midlands. Just 16% of the population live in one of the most deprived 20% of neighbourhoods in England, whereas 40% of people live in the least deprived 20%.

This is not the case for all Solihull communities and below average incomes and poverty is far more common among households in the three North Solihull wards (Smith's Wood; Kingshurst and Fordbridge; Chelmsley Wood). For instance:

- Just 47% of North Solihull households own their own home while 40% are social rented.
- 31% of the North Solihull working age population claim Universal Credit.
- 29% of North Solihull children aged 0-15 years live in a low income household.
- According to the IMD 52% of people in north Solihull live in one of the most deprived 20% of neighbourhoods in England, including 11% who live in the most deprived 5%.

About St Alphege

St Alphege is centred on Solihull town centre the Borough's economic, administrative and transport hub, including the Touchwood shopping centre and numerous high-end service sector office occupiers. The widespread affluence of the surrounding residential area is reflected by some of Solihull's most costly housing, although St Alphege also contains a relatively high proportion of private rented housing. St Alphege has few pressing socio-economic problems, although the town centre's thriving economy does create some additional crime risks.


The map on page 2 illustrates the neighbourhoods within St Alphege, based on the Office for National Statistics' LSOAs. Five St Alphege LSOAs, Broad Oaks, Solihull Tudor Grange, Blossomfield South, Monkspath North and Monkspath East overlap the ward boundary.

Population and Households

Population Size and Growth


The 2021 Census shows that 13,256 people live in St Alphege, representing 1,932 people per km² (Population density Solihull 1,213 and England 434 per km²). St Alphege has the 6th smallest population density of Solihull's 17 wards.

Between 2011 and 2021 the St Alphege population decreased by -276 people. This equates to a fall of -2.0% over this 10-year period. St Alphege is one of only two wards to record a decline in population contrasting with average increases of 4.6% for Solihull and 6.6% for England.

Solihull Population Growth 2011 - 2021




Population Age Groups

17% of the St Alphege population are under 16 years of age (including 4.4% aged 5 and under), 57% are working age and 25% are aged 65 and over (including 3.9% aged 85+).

The size of the under 16 population in St Alphege (17%) is smaller than Solihull (19%) or England (19%), while the number aged 65+ is proportionally larger (25% St Alphege, 21% Solihull, 18% England).


Age Structure in St Alphege



In the 10-years 2011 to 2021 population growth in St Alphege has been driven exclusively by those aged 65+ (+28% aged 65+). This has been offset by population decline among all other age groups, particularly young people aged 16-24 (-19%) and by those aged 35-49 (-17%).

Comparing the 10-year growth rates of St Alphege and England shows significant differences among all group under the age of 65 years. Nationally, the population has grown among these groups contrasting with decline in St Alphege.




Ethnicity

76% of the St Alphege population are white and 24% from an ethnic minority background. St Alphege has a proportionally larger ethnic minority population than either Solihull (18%) or England (19%). 76% of the ethnic minority population in St Alphege are Asian/Asian British, with this group representing 18% of all people in St Alphege.

Ethnic Minority Population in Solihull 2021




The ethnic minority population in St Alphege is proportionally higher among younger than older age groups. For instance, 36% of those under 25 are from an ethnic minority background compared to just 8% of those aged 65+.

The pattern in St Alphege is the same as in England, with the ethnic minority population higher among younger age groups in both. A sharp reduction in the ethnic minority population from the age of 50 onwards is evident in both St Alphege and England.

Ethnic Minority Population by Age St Alphege 2021




In the 10-years 2011 to 2021 the proportion of St Alphege residents from an ethnic minority background increased from 14% to 24% of the population.

Although the St Alphege population decreased by -2% the number of ethnic minority residents increased by 71% (1,344 individuals) in the 10 years to 2021. This was entirely offset by a fall of -14% (-1,618 individuals) in the number of white residents. In absolute terms the increase in St Alphege residents was largest among those from an Asian/Asian British background (+1,015 individuals).

Growth of 71% in the ethnic minority population in St Alphege in the 10 years to 2021 is higher than the England average (38%) but in-line with that for Solihull (+72%). Growth in the ethnic minority population in St Alphege is 9th Highest among Solihull's 17 wards.

<u>Religion</u>

76% of the St Alphege population who answered the Census religious identification question said that they had a religious faith, with 24% saying they had no religion. St Alphege has proportionally fewer people with no religion than either Solihull (35%) or England (39%).

Like Solihull and England as a whole, Christianity is the most common religious faith in St Alphege (58%). A notable feature of the St Alphege religious profile is the relatively large number of Hindus and Sikhs living in the ward.

Origin and Language


At the time of the 2021 Census, around 91% of the St Alphege population lived at the same address that they were resident in a year before. Of the remainder, most migrants lived elsewhere in the UK (87% of St Alphege migrants, 7% of St Alphege population) with a small number coming from outside UK (13% of St Alphege migrants, 1% of St Alphege population).



56% of the St Alphege overseas born population are from the middle East or Asia (1,123 individuals), with 23% born in another European country (454 individuals), 14% (277) in Africa and 5% (109) in the Americas & Caribbean.



The Census data shows that while a relatively large proportion of the St Alphege population were born overseas, the number of arrivals since 2014 is lower than the England average (28% vs 34%). By contrast 28% of the St Alphege overseas born population arrived prior to 1981 double the proportion nationally.


There are 5,332 households in St Alphege, with family households comprising 72% (3,834) and single person households 24% (1,290). Compared with the England and Solihull averages St Alphege has fewer single person households and more family households.

Households with Dependent Children in Solihull 2021




Single parent households represent 6% of all households (308 households) in St Alphege compared to over 11% across Solihull and England.

About 51% of single parent households in St Alphege contain dependent children. The proportion of single parent households with dependent children is considerably lower than the England average and the lowest in Solihull (2.9% of all households in St Alphege, 7.2% Solihull, 6.9% England).

Single Parent Households with Dependent Children in Solihull 2021




More households in St Alphege are occupied by older people than the benchmarks (31% of all households St Alphege, 26% Solihull, 22% England). This is largely because there are many more older couple households in St Alphege than across England (16% vs 9%).

The proportion of single older households in St Alphege more closely matches the national average and is smaller than that for Solihull.


Single Older People Households in Solihull 2021



Deprivation, Benefits and Poverty

For much of 2022 and 2023 UK households have been subject to high levels of inflation and a squeeze on living standards. This is reflected in local survey results, with 70% of respondents to the 2022 Place Survey saying that they were more worried about their finances than a year previously. This pattern was replicated across all three Solihull localities.

Index of Multiple Deprivation

The Index of Multiple Deprivation (IMD) is the official measure of deprivation in England produced by the Ministry of Housing Communities and Local Government (MHCLG). The IMD combines 39 economic, financial, social, environmental and housing measures into a single deprivation score for individual neighbourhoods called Super Output Areas (LSOAs) in England. There are 32,844 LSOAs in England and 134 in Solihull with an average population of 1,500.

The IMD therefore allows each LSOA neighbourhood to be ranked relative to one another according to their level of deprivation.

The 2019 IMD shows that Solihull is the least deprived upper tier Local Authority in the West Midlands and is ranked in the 2nd top quintile nationally.


Solihull is relatively polarised between large parts of the borough that rank among the least deprived areas of England and a concentration of neighbourhoods in North Solihull among the most deprived.



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Deprivation is substantially higher in the North Solihull wards of Chelmsley Wood, Kingshurst & Fordbridge and Smith's Wood than elsewhere in the borough. The deprivation evident in North Solihull is part of a wider area of disadvantage that spreads throughout east Birmingham.

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St Alphege's eleven LSOAs are, on average, ranked on the 94th percentile nationally, with the 17 Solihull wards ranging from the deprived Chelmsley Wood (9th percentile) to the advantaged St Alphege (94th percentile). On this basis St Alphege would be considered one of the least deprived areas in England.

Deprivation among the eleven St Alphege LSOAs ranges from Solihull Tudor Grange on the 80th percentile to the least deprived neighbourhood Monkspath East on the 99th percentile. There are no significant signs of deprivation in St Alphege.


Universal Credit

As of July 2023, 269 St Alphege residents were claiming Universal Credit (UC), equating to 3.3% of the working age population. The rate in St Alphege is much lower than for England (14.7%) and is the lowest in Solihull.

39% of the UC claimants in St Alphege are in employment and 61% not in employment, this is broadly in-line with the pattern across Solihull and England.


Universal Credit Claimant Rate in Solihull July 2023



Child Poverty

At the end of 2021/22, 86 children aged 0-15 years in St Alphege lived in a low income household. This equates to 4% of the 0-15 population, much lower than the England average (20%) and the lowest rate among the 17 Solihull wards.

The number of children living in a low-income household in St Alphege varies between age group. The pattern is different to England in that proportionally more in St Alphege are aged 11-15 years and fewer aged under 5.

The number of St Alphege children living in a low-income household averaged 84 in the six years 2016/17 to 2021/22. There was a small rise from 70 at the end of 2018/19 to 77 at the end of 2019/20 coinciding with the onset of the outbreak of covid-19. This rise is consistent with those across Solihull and England. This trend has persisted with the number increasing through to 2021/22.

The Income Deprivation Affecting Children Index (IDACI) is a component part of the IMD measuring the relative income deprivation impacting upon children aged 0-15 years. St Alphege's eleven LSOAs are, on average, ranked on the 89th percentile nationally of the IDACI, with the 17 Solihull wards ranging from the deprived Smith's Wood (6th percentile) to the advantaged St Alphege (89th percentile).



Older People Poverty

In February 2023 there were 107 older people in St Alphege claiming a pension credit. This equates to 3% of the pension age population lower than both the Solihull (9%) and England (11%) averages. St Alphege has the lowest pension credit rate among Solihull's 17 wards.

The Income Deprivation Affecting Older People (IDAOP) is a component part of the IMD measuring the relative income deprivation impacting upon older people aged 65 and over.

St Alphege's eleven LSOAs are, on average, ranked on the 93rd percentile nationally of the IDAOP, with the 17 Solihull wards ranging from Chelmsley Wood (21st percentile) to St Alphege (93rd percentile). 

Fuel Poverty

Fuel poverty is measured by the Department for Business, Energy & Industrial Strategy which determines that those households which are below the poverty line and at the same time are energy inefficient and fuel poor.

647 St Alphege households were classified as fuel poor in 2021. This equates to 9% of all St Alphege households, lower than the Solihull (12.7%) and England (13.1%) averages. Among the 17 Solihull wards St Alphege has the 2nd lowest fuel poverty rate.



Unemployment Rate in Solihull March 2021




Resident Employment


Occupation of Employed Population St Alphege 2021


Employed in Financial & Business Services in Solihull March 2021




Claimant Count Unemployment

As of August 2023, 100 people in St Alphege were in receipt of unemployment benefit. This equates to a claimant unemployment rate of 1.2%, much lower than the Solihull (3.2%) and England (3.8%) averages. Among the 17 Solihull wards the claimant unemployment rate in St Alphege is the lowest.


Resident Qualifications

On average, working age St Alphege residents have much higher levels of formal qualifications then the benchmarks. For instance, 58% of St Alphege residents (4,392 individuals) had NVQ level 4+ qualifications in March 2021 compared to 40% of the Solihull population and 37% of people in England.

Formal Qualification Levels 2021 St Alphege Population Aged 16-64






Disability in Population St Alphege 2021


Life Limited a Lot by Long – Term Health Condition Solihull Population 2021



Life Expectancy









Incidence of Cancer 2015 to 2019







Standardised Mortality Ratio



Standardised Mortality Ratio







Overcrowding

Overcrowding occurs when the number of bedrooms in the accommodation is less than the number required under this bedroom standard.



(Based on Number of Bedrooms)




Access to Car or Van

Households with access to a car or van in Solihull 2021





Satisfaction with local area as place to live





How has local area changed in last 2 years











Civic Participation


To what extent do feel able to influence decisions that affect your local area




Have taken part in formal volunteering in last year






Community Safety


Feeling safe after dark in local area

Crime Deprivation

St Alphege's eleven LSOAs are, on average, ranked on the 81st percentile nationally in terms of crime & disorder deprivation, with the 17 Solihull wards ranging from the crime & disorder deprived Kingshurst & Fordbridge (15th percentile) to the advantaged Knowle (85th percentile). On this basis St Alphege would be considered one of the least crime deprived areas in England.





Annual Reported Number of Crimes in St Alphege



The table below shows the number of recorded antisocial behaviour (ASB) incidents in the year to date (January-November 15th 2023). There have been 85 ASB incidents in St Alphege, 7.2% of the Solihull total and equating to 6.1 per 1,000 population. This is higher than the Solihull average of 5.4 per 1,000 and ranks St Alphege 5th highest of the 17 Solihull wards.
