#SENDSpotlight

Last year Solihull Council issued over 80% of new EHCPs within 20 weeks. This was significantly higher than the England average of 46% - making us the highest in the West Midlands and 37th in the country.

National updates

The Chancellors <u>Spending Review 2025</u> last month explained that the intended approach to SEND reform will be set out in the Schools white paper in the autumn. The long-awaited changes to the system will focus on increasing inclusion and improving outcomes for children and young people.

Additional Needs Board

The last joint additional needs board meeting took place on 4 July 2025. The key messages were:

- The Board heard about the plans for the upcoming Let's Talk SEND event and were pleased with the number of schools taking up the opportunity for their pupils to benefit from a range of discussions. *More detail on the event is included with this newsletter.*
- Members were advised that the <u>SoLO</u> contract for children's short breaks has been extended until August 2026 and noted how much families valued this offer.
- Members heard about the brilliant work Our Voices Heard were doing with children and young people and how schools were beginning to become more engaged to give their pupils more of a voice. A key focus has been understanding how more children and young people can better involved in decision making through their EHCP annual review.

Educational Psychology Service

- We have enjoyed a busy year working with everyone, especially our FCG meetings with a variety of professionals, ELSA supervision and training, collaborating with colleagues in other services and supporting a range of pupils in our schools. Thank you to all those who have liaised with and supported us, we are looking forward to working with you again next year!
- Over the Summer, we will be completing EHCs, writing-up remaining work, evaluating, preparing for the new year and planning training. Although it gets a little tricker for EHCs

in the holiday with schools being closed, we will do our best. We currently do not have any EHCs awaiting assessment, but as the Summer is a time when staff take holidays, we anticipate a waiting list will gradually build over the coming weeks. Therefore, we plan to complete additional EHCs in September with a view to catching up, as we did back in May. This means a month of slightly reduced service to schools over September which we hope colleagues will understand, but please be reassured that support for vulnerable pupils and critical incidents will remain ongoing. We wish you all a fantastic Summer!

Success Story of Supported Internship

Morgan is celebrating his success with his first paid job after he completed a Supported Internship which aims to support young people aged 16 and over with an EHCP to be ready for work. Early Years Updates

There has been quite a lot of news coverage about early years in recent weeks. The government has launched their strategy <u>Giving every child the best start in life - GOV.UK</u> outlining their plan for change for early years. This reinforces the importance of early years and the government has a reception and school readiness focus. We have a co-produced <u>Solihull School Readiness</u> definition. Some of the representatives of the group came back together to consider the national <u>Reception Ready</u> guidance.

We would like to stress that the suggestions and skills listed in the national guidance would be best used to *guide* parents about the skills that help children access reception learning and development. Many children can demonstrate these skills independently, after support, as they enter reception [aged between age 4 years old and age 5 years old who are born between 1st September and 31st August]. Supporting children to develop these skills will help them to get the most out of their reception year and to be as autonomous as they can be. We do not encourage the use of the 'Reception Readiness' guide as a checklist to be handed to parents as a list of skills children should be expected to master before starting reception. We heard from parents who welcome advice but feel overwhelmed when this is the approach. We hope that Solihull parents, children and schools will work together to understand what life is like in each reception class and how to help children to be prepared for being part of this larger group. That parents can share their knowledge about their child and discuss how best to support in a different way due to a child's unique needs. It is, however, a way we can share the national research and guidance which supports us to match the early years curriculum to age-guided expectations such

as guidance linked to language development, screen time, toilet training and oral hygiene. We shouldn't wait for children to be 'ready' but encourage readiness in a range of different ways. Solihull early years were asked to share information about our support for SEND with Local Government Association. This was summarised into a **case study**- linked below...
