Admissions Policy for admission in September 2020

While the governors of St. Margaret's School welcome applications from parents of all faiths and none, in the light of other good local provision of primary education nearby the Governors wish to ensure that the parents of committed church going families have an opportunity to send their children to a school where the Christian faith is embedded across the school in its ethos and curriculum.

Our admissions process is part of the Local Authority co-ordinated scheme. The application process starts in the autumn before admission and you can apply online at: www.solihull.gov.uk/admissions.

The school's admission number is 30. Where the number of applications is lower than the school's admission number, all applicants will be admitted. If there are more applications than places available then all applications received by the Local Authority's designated closing date for receipt of applications will be considered, together and at one time by a committee of the Governing Body.

Oversubscription criteria

If the number of applications for a particular year group exceeds the number of places available, the following criteria will be used.

1. Children looked after by a Local Authority (in line with section 22 of the Children Act) and children who were previously looked after but ceased to be so because they were adopted (or became subject to a residence order or special guardianship order).
2. Baptised or dedicated² (where appropriate to the denomination) brothers and sisters⁴ of pupils attending the school at the time of admission whose parents⁵ still **regularly**³ worship at a Trinitarian Christian Church.
3. Baptised or dedicated² children (where appropriate to the denomination) whose parents⁵ **regularly**³ worship at St Margaret's Church.
4. Baptised or dedicated² children (where appropriate to the denomination) whose parents⁵ worship **regularly**³ at another Trinitarian Christian Church.
5. Brothers and sisters⁴ of pupils attending the school at the time of admission.
6. Children whose parents⁵ are regular worshippers³ at any other place of religious worship.
7. Other applications⁷.

For late applications see note 9 & 10

Notes:

1. Children with an Education and Health Care Plan (EHCP) that names St. Margaret's School will be offered a place first. This will reduce the number of places available.
2. Governors of St. Margaret's School will accept proof of a service of 'Thanksgiving for the Gift of a Child' as dedication.
3. Regular attendance at a service of worship would be a *minimum* total of 24 weekly services, by one or both parents, in the school year immediately preceding application.
For admission in September 2020 this means a total of 24 weekly attendances in the period 1st September 2018 to 31st August 2019.
 - ✚ Parents who wish their attendance at St Margaret's Church to be taken into account by the governors should submit their "Step-by-Step" attendance card to clergy when asking them to validate their attendance as this is the evidence of attendance which the clergy will use.
 - ✚ Applicants from other churches (or places of religious worship) will be expected to provide a supporting letter written by a member of the clergy on letter-headed paper from the Church (or place of religious worship), confirming the number of one or both parent's weekly attendances during the previous school year: 1st September 2018 to 31st August 2019.

Weekly attendance would be one attendance by a parent at a worship service. If attending more than once in one week (e.g. on Sunday & Wednesday) ONE attendance will be counted and for these purposes Sunday will be counted as the first day of the week.

4. Under priority 2 & 5 a brother or sister must live at the same address and could be:
 - a brother or sister sharing the same parents;
 - a half-brother or half-sister, where two children share one parent;
 - a stepbrother or stepsister, where two children are related by a parent's marriage or civil partnership (a formal arrangement that gives same-sex couples the same legal status as married couples);
 - the separate children of a couple who live together; or
 - an adopted or fostered brother or sister.
 Priority is not given if the brother or sister attends the nursery unit as this is non statutory education.
5. Under priority 2, 3, 4 & 6, Section 576 of the Education Act 1996 defines 'parent' to include:
 - All natural parents, whether they are married or not
 - Any person who, although not a natural parent, has 'parental responsibility' for a child or young person
6. There is **no guarantee** of transfer from nursery to reception class; a further application must be made in the following year.
7. If offering places within any one of the criteria would cause the schools admission number to be exceeded, then children living nearest will be offered first. Distances are measured by the Local Authority's computerised admissions system. The admissions system uses six-figure grid references provided by the Local Land and Property Gazetteer (LLPG). The grid references provide a unique point on each property. If two or more applicants share the same distance to a school and only one place is available, the applicant to whom the place will be offered will be determined by the Local Authority by random selection (unless these are multiple births – in this case all the siblings will be admitted).
8. If possible, places will be offered to twins, triplets and children from other multiple births, as long as we comply with infant class size legislation.
9. Applications received after the closing date are late and will not be processed until after the published offer day. Late applications will be considered when places are allocated from the waiting list. Changes to on-time applications received before the Governors' admissions meeting will be considered if possible. Changes after this will be processed with late applications.
10. Waiting lists are produced in strict order of priority, against the over-subscription criteria and are managed by the Local Authority. Waiting lists are kept until the end of the autumn term.
11. A child's home address is the place where the child is permanently resident with his or her parents. When a child lives between two addresses, the address used for offering a school place will be where the child lives for most of the school week (Monday to Friday). If care is split equally, parents can choose which address will be used.
12. Applications made outside the normal admissions round (in-year admission) should be made to the Local Authority and the application will be processed by the Local Authority. If there is a vacancy in the relevant year group a place will be offered. If the year group is full the governing body will apply the admission criteria to the application so that it can be placed on the waiting list.
13. The Governing Body recognises its duty to comply with the Local Authority Fair Access Protocol to provide fair access to school for pupils who need a school place because they have missed, or are at risk of missing, education.
14. Parents who wish to appeal against the decision of the Governors to refuse their child a place in the school may apply in writing to the Chair of Governors at the school address. Appeals will be heard by an independent panel. There is no right of appeal for nursery as it is non-statutory education.
